


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Cover:

Bertha Gray died peacefully on June 4, 2008, at the Island Commons on Chebeague Island, with her family at her bedside.

She was born Bertha Mae Fieste on December 9, 1905, in rural central Pennsylvania. Her parents were Harry and Cora Fieste. Orphaned in her early teens, she was taken in by a neighboring farm



family. After high school, she had the venturesomeness to travel east to Philadelphia for study at the Presbyterian Hospital School of Nursing (1924-27), where she received her nursing degree. There she met and married a North Carolinian, Garland Alonza Gray, who was completing his medical studies at the University of Pennsylvania. When Dr. Gray was commissioned as a surgeon in the United States Navy Medical Corps, he and Bertha began a career of service to their country that lasted through the war years until his retirement from duty in the 1950's. From Honolulu, Hawaii, to Kodiak, Alaska, through stateside waiting while he served in the Pacific theater, to postings at numerous naval hospitals, Bertha made a home for her husband and two children, Sheila and Garland, Jr. Whenever there was need and opportunity, she returned to nursing.

In the mid-1950's, the Grays came to Chebeague Island, where they purchased the Falmouth House. It was the "anchor," in Bertha's

words, that she had always wanted for her family. There they began a second life of participation and service in the Island community. Initially summer residents, while Dr. Gray served as physician at the Choate School in Wallingford, Connecticut, they came to live year-round on Chebeague during his second retirement. The Falmouth house became an informal dispensary, where Dr. Gray volunteered medical care with Bertha by his side. Upon his death in 1983, she chose to remain on their beloved island.



For 25 years Bertha thrived in her Chebeague community, continuing to live in the Falmouth House until she was just short of 100, when she moved to the Island Commons for assisted living. A faithful member of the Chebeague Island Methodist Church, she prepared communion and worked actively for the Ladies Aid. Well into her nineties, she delivered Meals on Wheels and offered to carry the bags of others on and off the ferry boat. In every way she could, Bertha joined in Island activities, community meals, and gatherings. Her door was always open for neighbor children and friends. Almost daily she baked chocolate chip cookies, and on the chimney of the house next door, a seagull waited for its morning boiled egg and buttered toast. Passers by would see her in her garden, raking leaves, or shoveling snow--often beyond the bounds of her own yard. Her family was constantly told that she was "amazing," but Bertha did not think so. Independent, unassuming, giving naturally, she went about her days.

In 2002, she received a Living Legacy Award, honoring volunteerism, from the Southern Maine Agency on Aging. Long lived, she was presented with Cumberland's Boston Post Cane as its eldest citizen.

More recently, when recognized on her birthday in the Chebeague church, she said to the congregation, "I have had a happy life." She was a wonderful mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. Grateful for her life, her proud and loving survivors are: daughter Sheila Gray Jordan and her husband, Philip, of Chebeague; son Garland A. Gray, Jr. and his wife, Briana, of Danvers, Massachusetts; grandson John Jordan, a Chebeague lobsterman, and his wife, Catarina, of Yarmouth; grandson Philip Jordan and his wife, Jing, of Lawrenceville, New Jersey; grandson Thomas Gray of Key West, Florida; grandson David Gray and his wife, Julie, of Keene, New Hampshire; and seven greatgrandchildren.

Casco Bay Island Development Association had a year of providing community service to the Islands, and of watching out for their interests in Casco Bay policy making.

Once again, CBIDA provided the transportation for the children of Cliff, Chebeague and Long Island schools to join the Peaks Island children for a



"Meet the Authors" day and other school activities. CBIDA also contributed to Homestart, the Peaks Island affordable housing program.



In past reports I have referred to CBIDA as the lighthouse needed in bad weather or the watchdog ready to give a warning of possible danger to a family. Much of the time they just stand by. Standing by is not

very exciting or newsworthy, but the lighthouse and the watchdog need to be in place.

The recent request for a change in city zoning on Great Diamond Island to allow the addition of residential - hotel - condominium units at McKinley Estates in the former double barracks has called attention to the suitability and current maintenance of the aging wastewater

treatment system. The treatment system now faces the addition of extra kitchen and bedroom units effluence. CBIDA sees this proposal as a possible threat to the health of the waters of the entire bay, as well as a threat on the quality of life of all the islands. An unfortunate development on one island can too easily become a precedent for others.

CBIDA has made some internal changes. One change is in the time of Steering Committee meetings. Feeling that Saturday morning was inconvenient for many people, the Committee now meets each month on the first Wednesday, at 4 pm, at the Casco Bay Ferry Terminal Conference Room. As usual all meetings are open to the public. For more information call me at 766-2942.

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Chebeague Island Cemetery Committee

The Cemetery Committee arose out of our transition from Cumberland to becoming our own town. In separating from the Cumberland Cemetery Association, the Town of Chebeague Island received a transfer of funds to support the island cemeteries as mandated by State laws. Currently, the Committee is working on preparing Rules and Regulations that are applicable to Chebeague, preparation of new deed forms and record keeping procedures. Dick and Dianne Calder, who have capably maintained the cemetery for years, will continue their good works. Repair of a broken water line was accomplished in the spring of 2008. A metal sign that was once part of an old fence along North Road is being refurbished and will soon be installed.

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Chebeague Island Community Association

The Chebeague Island Community Association's mission is to ensure the survival and long-term viability of Great Chebeague Island as a year-round community. Our work this past year has continued to focus on affordable housing, and we have also begun to work on issues relating to economic development on Chebeague.

Our second annual meeting was held August 14, 2007. The big news of the day was that we (finally) received our official IRS status as a 501(c)(3) organization. Current board members include Mabel Doughty, Bob Earnest (president), Ester Knight, Jeff Putnam, John Wilson, Beth Howe (secretary), Cheryl Stevens (treasurer), and Ruth Slagle.



Our big news from 2007 was the purchase of a house at 226 South Road which serves as our pilot project for affordable housing on Chebeague. The purchase was made with help from the Genesis Foundation (grant money and a low interest loan),

the Island Institute (grant money), and numerous donations from members of the Chebeague community. The plan calls for rental of the house to tenant(s) selected by way of a rigorous application process. The selection committee was deliberately comprised of community members who had not previously been involved with the affordable housing committee, in order to ensure maximum fairness. The house will be rented for a period of at least 1½ years in order to learn more about the ins and outs of affordable rental housing. Then, the affordable housing committee and CICA will decide whether to continue to rent the house, or, to sell the house (which would follow a similar set of eligibility and application guidelines). We also plan to pursue improvements to the house, especially in the area of energy efficiency.

Our next steps in the affordable housing area will include the exploration of ways that land lease or purchase could be subsidized as a way to help potential residents build homes on Chebeague; and, the possibility of CICA - built rental housing on the Island.

Our work to date in the area of economic development has consisted primarily of support for the Comprehensive Planning Committee, in its pursuit of a comprehensive plan (which would serve to satisfy State of Maine requirements, and, as a potential vision for much of community life on Chebeague). In the months ahead, we hope to grow into a role as catalyst for local economic development for the community of Chebeague.

Our instructors in 2007 were Bobby Marsee as lead instructor, assisted ably by Isaac Julien, Taryn McGovern, Asa Julien, Kyra Freeman and Anna Maine, and by our junior instructors Persephone Bennett, Nate Richards and Hutch Hurwitz. Sarah Freeman this year. It promises to be another year of good boat time, instruction, games and healthy fun for all.

It is early April as I write this update - we still have snow on the ground, it's foggy, cold and windy, and spring appears as a distant light at the end of a cold and snowy tunnel. And yet, the registration list for the coming summer is almost full; instructors are heading off to training; CICSS boats are in the barn for needed repairs; the occasional patch of mud on the roads must mean that summer is near. We responded to the usual variety of calls this past year including a chimney fire that extended into the house. We had 100% turnout of members – not bad for 5:00 am. The crews did a fabulous job of quickly putting the fire out and the house is now back to normal and the owner happy to be home. I was very proud of the job well done. Its nice to see the results of the continued training.



Our training continues with some members going off-Island for classes, and they return with new ideas and methods. The crews work hard to have themselves and the equipment ready for work. We have submitted a grant

application thanks to the huge effort by Art Lynch and others. If the grant gets awarded, we will be able to purchase new gear and equipment, without impacting the tax base. We also will be applying for a grant to upgrade the generator at the fire station and town office. We hope to be able to secure both these grants this year and are looking into a grant for a new fire truck in a couple of years. Chebeague has never received a grant for the fire dept because of being a part of Cumberland.

The membership is about 25 now and we always need more help. We are currently working 2 new folks thru the system: Hank Weatham and Justin Doughty have joined us and are eager to learn. Thanks to those folks for stepping up and making the Island a safer place to live.

Please remember to keep your smoke detectors up and running and chimneys cleaned. Huge thanks go to Jason Hamilton, Ralph Munroe and Doug Ross for their hard work this year in getting things ironed out and keeping the department moving ahead.

This year we are doing it jointly with the Chebeague Historical Society. We place a green spray at each Veteran's grave (they number over 170 now). The Town of Chebeague buys American flags for each Veteran's grave and Joan Robinson places them. Cumberland Cemetery Association purchased all the Veteran's markers for us before we separated as a town.

The Thrift Shop continues under Sarah VanFleet and "helpers". They do a good job of merchandising all the "good stuff" coming in. Please do not bring us any "bad stuff". It is a huge job to separate and dispose of ripped dirty clothing, etc. Help us out. The money is used for insurance and the upkeep of the building.

This past year we delivered 18 Christmas boxes to deserving folks, plus the purchase of a nice roast pork for the Island Commons Christmas dinner (their choice). Grangers and several friends meet to pack the boxes with fresh fruit, home baked goods, a little candy, a small ham in each one, small cans of fruit, veggies and other surprises. You can certainly see the appreciation on each person's face when these are delivered.

Many people visiting our Library in April saw the display Martha Hamilton arranged for National Grange Month. There was much interest in the picture albums and memorabilia displayed. The Hall has sponsored two brunches, one in October and one in April, as well as a very successful Spaghetti Luncheon in January. The Town of Chebeague Island has been using the Hall for meetings and elections. Whalers, Quilters, Yoga, Flu Clinic, health screenings, summer theater groups and private gatherings have all used the Hall on many occasions throughout the year.

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Chebeague Island Library

They say time goes quickly when you are having fun. Well, this year flew by and we had a blast. The year 2007 will always be remembered as the year of our independence. The Library became an information repository and the community table was overflowing with updates from the various transition committees. It was a busy, busy year.

The Library was open 302 days and we counted 14,810 patrons come through the doors. They checked out 16,194 items in materials and 4,636 of them used the computers. This was quite an increase over 2006.



The Library always looks to the community for display, artist and program opportunities. This year was no exception. Doug Damon showcased his beautiful handcrafted creations of heavy equipment, old time cars, a motorcycle and desk clocks. It was hard for some of us to believe they were made entirely of wood. To complement study at school, a display on Africa was made even more special by the addition of Beth Dyer's photos and keepsakes from her time there as a Peace Corps volunteer. Our board president, Sally Tubbesing brought in

some photos of a South African school from a visit she had made. When looking for something to adorn a movie display, Martha Hamilton crafted our very own golden "Oscar" statuette. Peggy Dyer lent us her scrap books and photo albums from the early years of Chebeague theater, and we had fun picking out faces.

Luke Rothschild displayed his unique "rustings" and found objects sculptures. Luke also made and left for other artists to use, a supply of stands. Sandra Rice, Jane Hahn and Kim Rich also had space to display their art, over the year. To celebrate the spirit of volunteerism, Cathy MacNeill took dozens of photos of volunteers doing dozens of duties all over the Island. It is wonderful to have patrons come in just to see the artwork displayed or to pick out a face in a scrapbook.



Artist and dancer, Dunya (Dianne McPherson) astounded us with her creative presentation of dance, film and spoken word. We learned about Madagascar and lemurs from Grace Pease and her mother, Molly Nelson. We learned about Grace and Molly from Leila Bisharat. Actress Ellen Mulroney portrayed Jeannette Rankin in "Year of the Woman" and we thank the Hodges for bringing Ellen to Chebeague. Farmer Minor has a pig living with him and we were very glad to have them both come to the Library. Daisy met a huge crowd of people in

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the hall, and Farmer Minor read aloud to 100 of Chebeague's finest citizens.

The word community is used a lot on Chebeague. The Library is a community. The Library works because of the community. The community is you. Thank you for your patronage, support, ideas, involvement and volunteer efforts.

Chebeague Island Post Office



This has been a busy and exciting year for the Post Office. After spending almost exactly two years in a small trailer at the Boatyard, the staff and P.O. Operations are about to move into new, custom-designed space at the Boatyard's expanded facility. Both the temporary and the new permanent space have been provided by Paul Belesca, owner and manager of the boatyard.

The Post Office trailer, with its interior from the previous Post office at Shirley Burgess' house may be taken to Matinicus whose Post Office was recently lost in a fire.


For the inauguration of the new Town of Chebeague Island, Mac Passano designed a special Chebeague Island Post Office postal cancellation stamp and a limited edition envelope with a map of the new town drawn by the Maine cartographer Jane Crozen, and featuring the 60 cent Acadia National Park stamp originally issued in 2001. These covers with their affixed stamps were sold by the Historical Society as part of its contribution to the celebration of the new Town; I was at the first town meeting on July 1, 2007 to receive and cancel

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them. The issue was so popular that the "limited edition" grew somewhat and the Post Office was able to extend the time for cancellation.

We are now in the new facility at the Boat Yard and invite everyone to come and visit us.

Chebeague Island Rescue

The Town of Chebeague Island Rescue had a wonderful first year. We have a fabulous team of Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and First Responders. We also receive willing and much appreciated help from the Town of Chebeague Island Fire Department, Chebeague Transportation Company, the Town of Yarmouth, and the Cumberland County Sheriff's Department.

We no longer charge the patients for rescue services, however the Town of Yarmouth will charge for their portion of the rescue. By using Yarmouth's Rescue as our mainland link we have increased the number of hospitals to which patients may be transported; in addition to Portland hospitals Yarmouth will transport to Brunswick hospitals Parkview and Mid Coast.

Last fall the Life Flight Helicopter landed on Chebeague and the Rescue participated in a presentation about the services offered by Life Flight. This will be another resource available to our town to make life safer.



We plan to have another EMT class this year and hope that we get more volunteers. Please let Polly Wentworth know if you are interested.

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We are recruiting. We are also planning a Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) Instructor's class on the Island so that we will have at least ten CPR instructors available to educate everyone.

CPR can be a life-saving skill for babysitters, teachers, care givers and anybody else who may find themselves is a situation where they can save somebody's life.

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Chebeague Needleworkers

Chebeague's quilters, embroiders, appliqué-ers, knitters, hookers and scheer und schnitters had a pretty quiet year. We met as usual on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month and during the sociable days we knit mittens and sweaters, quilted baby quilts and wall hangings, hooked intricate rugs and cut ingenious paper designs. This has become so much a part of our day to day lives, that many members could hardly remember what projects they had completed. Regular summer people came and left again and returned this spring. An unusually large number of year-round people were gone for significant parts of this particularly long and snowy winter. Even so, the collective dinners drew ten to fifteen people, with the day-members joined by several like Lola Armstrong who usually can only come in the evening, and Thea Youngs, the Island Institute Fellow, who joined us for meals and knit when she wasn't working in the Town Office. And Peggy Jones, through a difficult year of care-giving, came when she could, making a quilt for Bob and one for her grand-daughter Catie.



However, two Victorian-style crazy quilts broke this quiet mold. This kind of quilt assembles squares out of random size and shaped pieces of fabric, basted to a muslin backing. Then each separate fabric piece is outlined in embroidery, using many different stitches in many different colors. The effect is a bit dizzying, in an ornate, Victorian manner. A uniform sashing between the squares may moderate the craziness a bit, but the general effect is rich and rather over the top.

One of the quilts was put together by Barbara Marks from squares made by her grandmother Jennie Mae Jacobs, and found in a trunk in Barbara's attic when the room was renovated. The squares were mostly in woolen fabrics, with embroidery both in embroidery floss and in wool yarn. When they were assembled with dark blue woolen sashing and borders of purple velvet and red wool, the effect was splendid.

The other crazy quilt introduced e m b r o i d e r y - e x p e r t S u s i e Stavropoulos to quilting. Still under way, it was inspired by Susie's accumulating collection of "fat quarters" - quarter-of-a-yard squares of fabric. So far this quilt is made up of 37 squares of randomly shaped cotton pieces in a large variety of colors and designs. Each piece is attached to its neighbors by colorful embroidery. The sashing material, which has not yet been cut into



strips is a batik-like green fabric. The result promises to be as splendid and over-the-top as Barbara's.

Quilts like these are rarely made these days - the piecing requires more work and color-sense than the more regular square/rectangular/triangular patterns that most of us do. And few people these days can, or are willing to spend the time to master the intricacies and range of the embroidery stitches that are required for a large quilt. So Susie follows in the footsteps of Jenne Mae Jacobs, keeping a Chebeague tradition alive.

If you like to do any kind of needlework or a related craft, come and join us, day or evening. We have a sewing machine to lend and are free with our expertise and advice.

Chebeague Transportation Company



In addition to serving our two host communities, CCLT also joined forces this past year with the Falmouth Land Trust and the Oceanside Conservation Trust of Casco Bay to form the state's first land trust collaborative, the Portland North Land Trust Collaborative. The purpose of Portland North is to provide its member trusts with a central repository for our documents, to share the costs and benefits of a professional staff to help manage our trusts more efficiently and to

secure regional opportunities and broader funding sources for our organizations. Each land trust will remain in control of its land-based activities, acquisition, and stewardship funding and management. Acquisition funds will stay within control of the individual trusts for their local projects. The early part of the vision proved that our collective interests will be well served by Portland North.

We were very fortunate to find Jessica Burton to staff Portland North and again fortunate to find grant funding to both support the costs of the collaborative and to help us put a plan in place that will improve the opportunities that regional collaboration will bring us. Portland North completed an intensive planning session this winter; it is now moving ahead in developing a plan for strategic and regional conservation planning for our region. Our coastal lands will receive the benefits from the collaborative's combined efforts.

At this time last year, CCLT was also working diligently to advance the potential of the Second Wind Farm. Chuck Varney and his supporters decided to pursue their goals without CCLT and the opportunities it could provide as the recipient of federal farm and ranchland conservation grants.

CCLT is currently working with several landowners on the mainland towards their conservation objectives. We hope to close on two more significant easements before year end. Our volunteer cooks and servers whipped up tasty meals such as roast pork, strawberry shortcake and green salads for the Island community to enjoy. One fun change is that we've teamed up with the Chebeague Island Hall and Community Center so that our lunches are more centrally located. As a result, we have increased the numbers served. Senior Luncheon will continue again this October.

Winter is a time of introspection here on Chebeague, and in February 2008 ICRC took the innovative step of looking into ways to enable Island elders to stay in their own homes longer. ICRC held a series of focus groups to garner input from the community. It was discovered that Islanders need assistance with day-to-day items such as shoveling walkways, shopping and transportation. A committee is looking at ways to help in these areas.

On a financial note, the active part of the Island Commons Endowment Campaign comes to an end on 08/08/08. The original goals were to raise \$50,000 in annual donations for each of the three years of the Campaign, and \$800,000 In gifts and pledges for the Endowment. Thanks to the generosity of our Island friends, our annual goals have been met. However we still have a way to go in order to achieve our Endowment goals. The Endowment Committee and the Finance Committee are looking into new ways to accept donations through planned giving initiatives such as bequests and charitable gift annuities.

However, as might be expected, the first year has been a busy one and the Selectmen and Town Administrator have been too busy to detail the events since July 1, 2007. This short article will summarize the high points of the year.

- # The first Town
 Meeting was held on July 1, 2007. The first Board of
 Selectmen and School Committee (previously elected on June
 24) were sworn in and all warrant articles were passed.
- # With certain exceptions, the ordinances of the Town of Cumberland were adopted by the new Town, to be modified as needed.
- # Boards and Committees were created and populated by a large number of Chebeague citizens.
- # The Town Office and other Town functions were established and operational policies and procedures established.
- # Our original Town Administrator, Ron Grenier, resigned early in 2008 to be replaced by North Yarmouth's former Town Administrator, Scott Saver.
- # The second annual Town Meeting was held on June 7, 2008. Donna Damon was re-elected to the Board of Selectmen and all warrant articles were passed.
- # The budget as passed at Town Meeting anticipates no increase in the property tax mill rate.

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It's Unanimous!

As we move into our second year of independence, I believe that the mood on the Island is that the new Town is working well. As usual, the success of the Town of Chebeague Island is dependent upon the continued involvement of all Island residents, year-round and seasonal. We applaud their efforts to date.
